RESPONSIBLE DISPOSAL OF OBJECTS CONTAINING MERCURY

Did you know that throwing away one fluorescent light bulb could pollute up to 6,000 gallons of water with toxic mercury?

On January 1 of this year the disposal of products containing mercury at landfills, transfer stations, and incinerators became prohibited in New Hampshire. This ban covers products including: thermometers, compact fluorescent light bulbs (CFLs), some antibacterial products, and even mercury switches in select brands of children's light up sneakers (see the chart below for complete listing).

These items will be accepted at the Southeast Regional Refuse Disposal District's annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection Day which will be held at the **Town Garage in Brentwood on September 13th**. Please call 929-9510 for times.
