VIDEO RECORDING OF HAMPTON FALLS MUNICIPAL MEETINGS HAS ARRIVED

In order to ensure openness and access to Town government, the Hampton Falls Selectboard has contracted with “Town Hall Streams” to record and make available to residents all municipal Board, Committee and Commission meetings conducted in the main hall and has established a policy relating to live and on demand streaming of Hampton Falls Municipal Boards, Committees and Commissions meetings. A link has been added to the home page of the Town’s website (www.hamptonfalls.org) for access to live streaming of meetings on-line or viewing at a later date.

BRUSH DUMP

The Town’s **Household Waste Collection Day** is set for Saturday **May 18**, 8 am to 2 pm at the Hampton Falls Brush Dump at the corner of Drinkwater and Parsonage Roads.

Effective 2018, there is only one day scheduled each year
for bulky household waste collection.

Dump stickers are not required for this Household Waste Disposal Day; instead, a **\$10 per trip fee** will be charged. Unexpired stickers will be honored until expiration.

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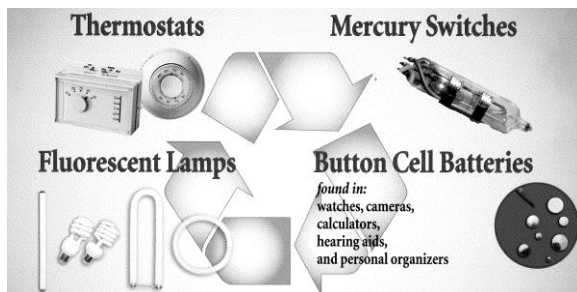

Disposal of Certain Products Containing Mercury (Hg)

The Town of Hampton Falls has benefited from a grant sponsored by the Town's disposal contractor, Covanta Energy. A Universal Waste Shed is located at the Town's Brush Dump for the purpose of collecting certain products containing mercury; specifically, thermostats, mercury switches, florescent lamps, button cell batteries and alkaline batteries.



Residents can also dispose these items during the annual Household Waste Collection Day on May 18. Thank you for your help in disposing of these items in a safe manner and protecting the environment!

2019 DOG LICENSES

The 2019 dog tags are available from the Town Clerk's office (in person or on-line). **ALL DOGS IN TOWN SHOULD BE LICENSED BY APRIL 30** each year as required by state RSA 466:1. Rabies vaccination certificate(s) are only required if rabies expiration date has expired. **Each dog not licensed by May 31 will automatically receive an additional \$25 civil forfeiture (RSA 466:13).** If you no longer own a dog(s), call 926-4618; Ext. 1, or E-mail us at townclerk@hamptonfalls.org; and we will remove your name from the list.

VEHICLE REGISTRATION INFORMATION

Please show photo I.D. for all motor vehicle transactions (for your insurance fraud protection).

-Renewals and transfers require the original, current registration(s) RSA 261:168 (copies are to be kept in your vehicle(s)).

-A notarized Power of Attorney is required when signing a title application for another person (even your spouse).

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-Please allow time for processing your transactions by arriving as far in advance of our closing times of noon and 3:30 p.m. as possible (by 11:45 a.m. or 3:15 p.m. at the very latest).

-A limit of 2 “regular” (renewals) vehicle transactions per person after 3:15 p.m. please. Financial closeouts are required daily at 3:30 p.m. Credit/debit card transactions are closed at 3:15 p.m.

-All transactions may be done through the mail if you can’t get in to our office (call 926-4618, Ext. 1 or E-mail us (townclerk@hamptonfalls.org) for instructions.

-Only ONE check required payable to “Town of Hampton Falls” which now includes town and state fees for your vehicle registration(s).

-All Major Credit/Debit Cards are accepted for payment. An additional credit/debit card fee (percentage of your total amount) applies to all card transactions.

Cash payments should be as close to the amount due as possible -- no large bills please (we keep limited cash).

INTERNET VEHICLE RENEWALS

We recommend completing your vehicle renewal(s) over the internet (E-Reg). Click on the plate link on the Town Clerk’s web page (www.hamptonfalls.org) for instructions, and you will receive your registration(s) and decal(s) through the mail. Renewals over 3 months late and residents wanting to make changes, complete transfers or obtain new plates will still need to come in to the office.

FILING FOR A MARRIAGE LICENSE

Please call ahead to schedule an early afternoon appointment when coming in to apply for a new marriage license. Limited staff prevents us from being able to process a license “on the spot.” The cost is \$50 and requires both persons’ I.D.s and final divorce or death certificates if filing for a subsequent marriage other than your first.

VITAL RECORDS AND 3-YEAR DUMP STICKERS ON-LINE

You can request “certified” copies of NH Birth, Death, Marriage and Divorce certificates on-line by choosing Vital Records on the town web page which will take you to EB2Gov for processing. Limited staff prevents us from being able to produce certified copies “on the spot.” Requests for self-cling, 3-year brush dump stickers are available on-line or from the Town Clerk’s office at a cost of \$30 each.

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TOWN CLERK'S OFFICE CLOSED FRIDAYS

A reminder that the Town Clerk's office will be closed on Fridays from June through December.

IMPORTANT! Many of you are using online banking. Please schedule your payment to arrive on or before the due date. Most systems require 5 – 6 days to deliver a payment. Please do not postdate your check, by law we cannot hold your check in the office until the posted check date. The check will be returned to you if the check is postdated and could result in the payment being late and incurring interest.

The first tax bill for 2019 will be mailed in May and will be due in July. In addition to mailing your payment you can deposit a check in the lock box by the Town Hall front entrance or in the hallway outside of the Tax Collector's office. If you would like a receipt, please provide us with a self-addressed, stamped envelope.

You can also make payments online at www.hamptonfalls.org, on the right hand side of the home page. Please be aware that there is a \$0.95 bank fee for using an online check or 2.95% to use credit cards.

Tax liens were executed for 2018 delinquent taxes on April 11, 2019. Interest on delinquent taxes is calculated on a daily basis. Please go online or call this office to obtain an accurate balance due. If you have any questions regarding your taxes, interest, setting up a payment schedule or need copies of your paid receipts for the IRS, please call the tax office at 926-4618 ext. 4.

Many of you have inquired about the State claim forms for Low and Moderate Income Homeowners Property Tax Relief. If you have qualified for the program in prior years, the claim form will be **sent to you** after May 1, 2019. If you would like to apply for the program and have not done so before, the (DP-8) Forms will be available in Town Hall after May 1st. Spring is here and we remind you of a few items and other services that HFFD offers besides emergency ambulance and fires calls.

- Time to renew your annual fire permits for fire pits, Chimineas, or portable fire rings (brush piles still need a separate 1-day permit).
- Check your batteries in smoke and/or carbon monoxide detectors.
- Fire extinguishers should be turned upside down and shaken if they have been motionless for a long period of time and gauges should be in the 'green.'
- We teach CPR and First-aid classes.
- We offer blood pressure checks and baby seat vehicle installations.

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- We will do a home fire safety inspection and help you develop a fire safety plan.
- Provide information on 'emergency preparedness kits.'
- We offer fire extinguisher classes.
- Station tours / Q&A for kids of all ages are available anytime.

MOSQUITO CONTROL - The mosquito control program begins in April. Crews check swamps, woodland pools, ditches, salt marshes, storm drains and other shallow, stagnant water for mosquito larvae. When mosquitoes are found, insecticides are used. We all need to do our part to protect our families from this potentially life altering illness. The steps are simple and only require a little diligence by making sure standing water is not allowed to pool in little, or unused items like old tires, playground equipment, sandboxes, or anything that can hold water for the larvae to breed.

Residents who do not want their wetlands treated may use Dragon Mosquito's No-Spray Registry online at www.DragonMosquito.com/No-Spray-Registry or write to Dragon Mosquito Control, P. O. Box 46, Stratham, NH 03885. Be sure to include your name, physical address, phone number, and a description of your property with boundaries. Residents who would like to have their stagnant water checked for mosquitoes may call the office at **734-4144** or email Info@DragonMosquito.com. There is no charge for this service. Contact them for more information on spray dates, location, materials used, precautions or other concerns.

CONSIDERING A SUMMER PROJECT? - With warm weather on our doorstep, the projects we envisioned during the winter are now on the shortlist. Before you spend your hard earned money, remember that permits are required for most, if not all building projects in or around your home. There are many things to factor in such as setbacks from property lines and wetlands. Adding a bedroom or accessory dwelling to your home may require a new septic design. Time must be allocated for design and approval. Do you know where your underground utilities and septic system are located before any digging is done? Call the building office as part of the planning process. We can help get everything in place.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY – Anne Coombs, Secretary

Spring has sprung, flowers are blooming and everyone is becoming more active as they bloom coming out of winter hibernation. The Hampton Falls Historical Society is blossoming with ideas for the upcoming year(s). The society has begun the process of interviewing architects to help realize our vision for the museum. We need to convert our old library into a space that efficiently and safely stores our artifacts, janitorial items and provides space for public meetings, board meetings, exhibit display, office space and study space. In addition, the building needs an upgrade of the electrical and HVAC systems. We are so excited about this project and hope to have it realized by the town celebration of 2022. Volunteers are needed to help bring

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this to fruition. This building is and contains the town's history, supported by our residents and former residents. Please give us an assist in any manner you are able, large or small.

Linda Hladik, a Trustee of the Board, continues to research the history of holders of the Boston Post Cane which is held by the oldest resident in town. Upon passing, the cane then passes to the next oldest resident. The first cane was presented in 1909 to Joseph W. Moulton. The current holder is Mary Titus. Linda has found quite a few of the holders over the years but there are gaps. If anyone has any information or pictures, we would appreciate learning about whatever you have in order to complete this research project and fill in those gaps. The original cane currently resides in a lovely display case in the Town Hall. The holder actually has a replica of the original. Jim and Gisela Manna, owners of a local Garden Center and residents of our town, have offered to fill and tend the flower urns on the front portico of the Museum. We are planning to have them do the arrangement as a free workshop for container flowers which will be open to the public at the Museum. The date is to be announced so please watch for emails and check us on Facebook.

Historical Society membership runs from May 1st thru April 30th of the following year. Membership renewal or to join postcards will be in the mail soon. The cards are a picture of farming in the yesteryears and a good example of Hampton Falls' history. We are a 501(c)(3) non-profit entity and receive no tax based dollars to support our operational costs. HERITAGE COMMISSION - Beverly Mutrie, Chair

The Heritage Commission has been meeting regularly every month and at our last meeting, we re-elected Beverly Mutrie, Chair, David French, Vice-Chair with Beverly filling in as Secretary. We welcomed Lou Gargiulo, Selectman, as our fifth member with full voting powers. The other two Commissioners are Mary Ann Hill and Phil Chura.

Commissioner Phil Chura, a local photographer, has been actively taking pictures of historic homes with his still camera and his drone. He has enjoyed learning about his neighbors and their dwellings. The pictures will be put into our database of Historic Resources for future submissions to the State Register or just discover the progression of settlement since the early 1700s of the town as well as document the architecture of our oldest buildings. We are still looking for the Warren Brown Boulder at the corner of Old Stage and Brown Roads. Please let us know if you can pinpoint it in the overgrowth.

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We sincerely thank the voters for supporting our Heritage Warrant Article this year as we are also contemplating putting the Joseph Cram house, built in 1835, on the State Historic Register, which will be costly. The Cram house and barn at 223 Exeter Road, was later home to the Rev. William A. Cram family, of which Ralph Adams Cram, the famous architect, was one of the sons. We will be discussing this and other possible State Historic Register candidates in the coming year and hoping to have at least one done by 2022 for our 300th town anniversary.

Over the winter we have diligently been working on a Guidebook of Historical Resources for our Town along with other regular business, including monitoring our Heritage Fund, researching historic house plaque makers, researching the two memorial bridges in town and reviewing a demolition permit for 86 Drinkwater Road. Sound Interesting?

We welcome other prospective alternate Commissioners to attend our monthly meetings, usually on the 2nd Monday at 2 PM at the Town Hall. Learning more about our town's architecture along with our history is apropos for those who care about our heritage. Come join us!

Programs:

The month of May will be a very busy month at the Library! Darryl Thompson will present **The Shaker Legacy** on **Saturday, May 4 at 1:00 p.m.** The Shakers made ingenious contributions to diverse fields such as agriculture, medicine, music, and furniture design. Darryl will explore these contributions as well as share his personal stories of the Canterbury Shakers. This program is sponsored by NH Humanities.

On **Thursday, May 9 at 6:30 p.m.** Professor of Art and Design Lance Hidy will discuss the famed photographer and environmentalist **Ansel Adams**. This program is sponsored by The Friends of the Library.

The Hampton Falls Conservation Commission will present an informational session on **Invasive Plants** on **Thursday, May 16 at 6:30 p.m.** Learn how to identify and control invasive plants. Museum Passes:

The Library offers passes for free or reduced admission to the following museums: The Currier Museum in Manchester, the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston, Strawberry Banke in Portsmouth, the American Independence Museum in Exeter, and the Wright Museum of World War II in Wolfeboro. This year, the Friends of the Library have added passes to the McAuliffe-Shepard Discovery Center in Concord, and to the many facilities in Historic New England and NH State Parks. Book Group for Grownups:

On **Thursday, May 30**, the adult book group will be discussing The Widows of Malabar Hill by Sujata Massey. This book is a murder mystery set in India in 1921. Perveen Mistry, the daughter of a respected Zoroastrian family, has just joined her father's law firm. She finds herself in a unique position to investigate a murder in a household where females live in strict seclusion.

On **Thursday, June 27**, the group will discuss The Library Book by acclaimed author Susan Orlean. In 1986, a disastrous fire struck the Los Angeles Public Library. Did someone

deliberately set fire to the library? In addition to following the suspected arson case, the author depicts the roles that public libraries have played in American communities.

New Backpacks:

Besides funding museum passes, the Friends and Trustees of the Hampton Falls Free Library have created three backpacks. These backpacks contain everything you need for a day in nature, such as binoculars, compasses, and trail maps. There is a backpack for the Seacoast, the mountains, and a shoulder bag for birding.
